

**Heart Disease and Women** – Coronary Heart Disease (CHD) – the most common type of heart disease – is the #1 killer of both men and women in the United States. Another type of heart disease: Coronary Microvascular Disease (MVD), also pose a risk for women.

The coronary arteries supply blood to the heart muscle. These arteries run along outside the heart and have small branches that dive into the heart muscle to bring it blood.

Coronary Heart Disease —is a disease in which plaque builds up on the inner walls of your coronary arteries. When plaque builds up in arteries, the condition is called atherosclerosis.

Plaque is made up of fat, cholesterol, calcium and other substances found in the blood.

Hardened plaque narrows the coronary arteries and reduces the flow of oxygen-rich blood to the heart. This can cause chest pain or discomfort called angina. If the plaque ruptures, a blood clot can form on its surface. A large blood clot can mostly or completely block blood flow through a coronary artery. This is the most common cause of a heart attack.

Although men and women can experience chest pressure that feels like an elephant sitting across the chest, women can experience a heart attack without chest pressure.

Instead they may experience:

- pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach
- shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort
- nausea, lightheadedness or breaking out in a cold sweat
- extreme fatigue

Coronary Microvascular Disease (MVD) is a heart disease that the heart's tiny arteries are damaged or diseased. Many researchers think that a drop in estrogen levels during menopause combined with other heart disease risk factors causes coronary MVD.

With coronary MVD - you may feel pressure or squeezing in your chest, shoulders, arms, neck, jaw or back. You may also notice a feeling of indigestion, shortness of breath, sleep problems, fatigue and lack of energy.

Coronary MVD symptoms often are first noticed during routine daily activities (such as shopping, cooking, cleaning and going to work) and times of mental stress. This differs from CHD, in which symptoms often appear while a person is being physically active-such as while jogging, walking on a treadmill or going upstairs.

It is extremely important that if you are having any of the symptoms discussed here that you do not disregard, ignore or put off calling 911 until later. Even when the signs are subtle, the consequences can be deadly, especially if the victim doesn't get help right away.

# <u>Call 911 immediately, explain to them exactly how you are feeling and get to a</u> hospital right away.

The good news is that you can lower your risk of heart disease by:

- Schedule an appointment with your healthcare provider to learn your personal risk for heart disease.
- Quit smoking- after just one year you could cut your risk of a heart attack or stroke by 50%.
- Start an exercise program-just walking 30 minutes a day can lower your risk for heart attack and stroke.
- Modify your diet with healthier snacks, better prep methods, and chose leaner meats.

### **Charles Baber Preservation Trust**

Yes, Spring will soon be here. Although, the month of February has really confused the trees with very warm days, melting snow, then two feet of snow, frigid days, heavy torrential rain days, and then warm days again. However, when Spring finally arrives, in particular by April, it is a very busy time at the Baber Cemetery because it is spring clean-up time. There is windblown trash and litter to be picked-up, and many fallen branches to be gathered up. If they are really big and heavy, they have to be cut first. The buildings have to be inspected for winter damage, and the lawn mowing and weed whacking equipment has to be serviced. And as mentioned in the *GateHouse Views* newsletter, we at some point will need to purchase a new leaf vacuum at a cost of \$4,000. This purchase won't occur until we have received enough donations to cover the purchase price.

March at the Baber cemetery is a quiet month with the soil gently thawing from the freezing winter temperatures; and with the snow quietly melting. But the tree leaves don't unfurl until April. The first of the trees to awaken are 'red sunset' red maple that run the length of Mt. Laurel Ave. from the 16th Street entrance to the chapel. The red maple have a red coloring on their tiny leaves before they begin to open and turn green. Other trees, like the sugar maple down passed the pond and the Norway maple in front of the chapel will start to show signs of faint green leaves. The trees like the pin oak in the half loop by the 16th Street entrance and along the east Market St. wall, and the swamp white oak to the west of the pond, and the dawn redwood, one section down and to the east of the pond, are still carrying their brown leaves from the fall. The new growth is slower in coming because the old leaves must be dropped first. By the end of April and into the first week of May, many of the remaining trees, like the American Beech down from the Atkins mausoleum, the white oaks by the 14th Street entrance, and the London planetree by the west Market St. wall are also starting to bud.

Before we say good-bye to winter and before the leaves have fully developed and enveloped the trees, take some walks and enjoy the trees as they stand now in their barren state. Notice the many different trunks. Notice the striations of the trunks. Some like the red oak have very long deep, sharp edged striations. Some trees, like the pin oak have groves, but their surface is flat. Others have many blocked shaped groves, while others have diamonds shaped groves. Some trees like the American beech and the red maple have very smooth trunks. Some trunks have dark spots while others, like the planetree have large light spots. And the trunk colors differ from specie to specie. Some are pale brown, some are grey, and some have a reddish color. So much to see and so little time remain in the winter season to really see each tree.

And while we are catching our last fleeting glimpses of the barren trees with their exposed trunks, take note to the arborvitae and the evergreens like the Norway spruce and the Eastern white pine. While they stand very prominently now among the bare landscape, soon they will be overshadowed and hidden by wide massive full volume leaf laden trees.

Besides the excitement of Spring finally being here, and the budding trees, we have an exciting event known as our Arbor Day tree planting and blessing day. At Baber Cemetery, the Arbor Day tree planting and tree blessing service is celebrated on April 29 at 2:00. We will be planting 10 new trees, primarily by the pond area. The trees are available for adoption or sponsorship at \$400 per tree. The majority of the proceeds will be used to removed old dead or diseased trees. There are still several partially dead ones with hollow trunks that will have to be removed this year before they fall and damage something or hurt someone. If you can sponsor a tree, that would be wonderful. If you can't then come anyway and enjoy the service, the tree proclamation by the City Council representative, the reading of poems by high school students, and the blessing of the trees. It is a rewarding experience and an all around fun day.
