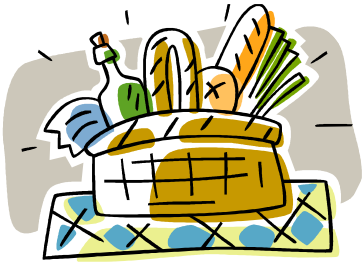

# CHARLES BABER PRESERVATION TRUST

## AUTUMN

It is hard to believe with all this hot weather and high humidity that within a few weeks, we will be enjoying a cool and colorful fall season. One of the most spectacular and breathtaking seasons at the Charles Baber Cemetery is its fall season. The sugar maples, down from the pond, change from green to yellow, and are one of the first trees to drop their leaves. The Norway maples, by the chapel, change from a green to a brownish color. The red maples and Japanese red maples dotted throughout the cemetery are like fine red wines as they change into their burgundy and merlot colors. There are 4 particular noteworthy Japanese red maples: two look like giant snowballs and can be found down the hill from the chapel with one by the entrance to the carriage house (barn), and the 2nd midway in the section across from it and closer to the Market St. wall. The other two red maples have shapely dark brown twisting limbs that extend their branches outward as if offering a bouquet of bright red leaves. Both are located to the right when entering the main entrance. There is also a shy weeping Japanese maple which is directly above the 2nd steep flight of steps leading from the upper road to the Market St. wall. If you stand at the bottom of the steps, you can look up into the tree and see the sunlight on the golden red leaves. The mock orange tree, inside the 12th street entrance near the barn, is a late bloomer, and is now in full array of its white flowers. Soon the flowers will turn to light violet and then to brown. The road leading from the 16th Street entrance up the hill to the chapel is lined with flashy 'red sunset' red maples. Stop and look at the multicolored star shaped leaves of the Homestead Hybrid Elm, on the road passed the breast of the pond. Some green leaves are turning yellow, others are orange, some rust, and some have a combination of all three colors on one leaf. And don't forget the teardrop shaped European Hornbeams with helmets of gold and breast plates of green as they stand guard in their line formation along Market St.

There are acorns everywhere from the mighty white oaks and the tall red oaks. The acorns come in the nick of time for the squirrels to store them away for the winter. The few black walnut trees along the fence line by the Middle School are also shedding their tough shell nuts. The tall gangly female ginkgo in the middle section across from the carriage house has begun to drop her odorous pulpy fruit. The green berries on the yew trees by the main entrance are changing to red. And the dark green fluffy appearing pompoms of the cryptomeria trees are taking on their brownish winter tint. There is so much to see and not enough article room to cover the fall extravaganza of our trees. You will have to come and see for yourself, and perhaps you will find a hidden tree treasure of your own.

## RESTORATION PROJECT

As of the date of this writing, the very extensive drain work throughout the property is now complete. All three drains down the hill from the chapel by the spring were fully blocked. The pipes had to be completely removed and replaced. All the drains received new basins and grates. One drain, that was asphalted over and had broken terra-cotta pipes, was dug up with its piping replaced and with a new basin and grate. Two drains had to be added, based on the recommendation of the engineer because the one existing drain on the road towards the Comloquoy mausoleum could not be fixed. It laid below the ground level of the pond. All the drainage pipes running through the field near the pond were broken and had to be replaced. A concrete basin and grate had to be placed in the field to catch the water from the first three drains mentioned earlier. The last 3 drains, all the new piping, and the new catch basins cost \$10,072.20 with \$3,000 paid and a balance due of \$7,072.20, which has not been paid as of this date. Part of the bill will be covered by the two co-chairs either through a trust fund or from personal money. However, the final coat and sealer on the road at the 16th entrance remains to be done at a cost of \$3,550.

We have \$1,300 in the checking and may raise \$500 at the 2015 Baber Day raffle and from the "free will" offering at the food table. This will leave a shortfall of \$1,800 to complete the roadwork. We, the committee and particularly the two co-chairs, would really like to see the project completed and put to "rest". So we are asking all of you readers, if you have not contributed to the project, please consider doing so now. It is a project which absolutely had to be done to decrease the rain water entering the property from 16th Street, and to stop the water from the blocked drains laying as a wet area next to the pond and along the road to the Comloquoy mausoleum. Please make a charitable donation. Thank you.

## **NEWS FROM MARION C. PRICE TRUST FUND**

**Scam Alert** – With so many online stores available, it's sometimes very difficult to know the difference between a legitimate e-commerce site and a fake one set up to steal money or a person's identity.

Operating out of China, scammers set up generic online stores that sell name-brand items or mimic the websites of big name-brand companies. On these sites, scammers sell fake or counterfeit products at significantly reduced prices designed to attract buyers looking for a big deal on name-brand merchandise. The over-reaching goal of these scammers is to gain access to the credit card numbers of their victims and then use the numbers to fraudulently make purchases or make a buck with the information on the black market. In some cases, the criminals even go so far as to send fake or counterfeit products to victims. As the merchandise ships from international locations, victims often remain unaware of any wrong-doing against them until weeks have passed. Although many brand companies discover these sites and shut them down, it's usually too late.

**Shingles Vaccine** - Shingles is a painful skin rash that develops on one side of the face or body. Shingles vaccine reduces the risk of developing shingles and the long-term pain that can follow. Your risk of shingles and long-term pain from the disease increases as you age. It is recommended for people age 60 years and older. Even if you have had shingles, you can still receive the shingles vaccine to help prevent future occurrences of the disease. There is no specific time that you must wait after having shingles before receiving the vaccine. Protection from the shingles vaccine lasts about 5 years.

Shingles is caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox. After the person recovers from the chickenpox, the virus stays in the body in a dormant (inactive) state. The virus can reactivate years later, causing shingles.

Shingles usually starts as a painful rash on one side of the face or body. The rash forms blisters that typically scab over in 7-10 days and clears up within 2-4 weeks. Before the rash develops, there is often pain, itching or tingling in the area where the rash will develop. This may happen anywhere from 1-5 days before the rash appears. You may also experience fever, headache, chills and an upset stomach.

If your healthcare provider thinks you are a candidate for the shingles vaccine they will help you determine if your insurance will cover the cost and locations offering the vaccine.



**Mom's Meals** independent at home program provides fresh-made, nutritious and great tasting home delivered meals. Cost is approx. \$6.49 per meal. Fully-prepared, nutritionally balanced meals provide up to 700 calories with protein, vegetables, grains and snacks and are delivered in fresh-lock packages and climate controlled containers that stay ready to eat in the refrigerator for 14 days.



**Flu Vaccine** –Will be available very soon. It is the best protection against the flu this season. Flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctor visits and missed work and school, as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations and deaths. It is especially important to get the vaccine if you, or someone you live with, or someone you care for is at high risk for complications of the flu.

A flu vaccine is needed every season for two reasons. First, the body's immune response from the vaccination declines over time, so an annual vaccine is needed for optimal protection. Second, because flu vaccines are constantly changing, the formulation of the flu vaccine is reviewed each year and sometimes updated to keep up with changing flu viruses. For the best protection, everyone 6 months and older should get vaccinated annually.

It takes about two weeks after the vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against influenza virus infection. In the meantime, you are still at risk for getting the flu. That's why it's better to get vaccinated early in the fall, so you are protected before the flu begins spreading in your community. However, as long as the flu virus is circulating, vaccination should continue throughout the flu season. Flu season usually peaks between December and February, but activity can last as late as May, so it is never too late to get the vaccine.

Talk to your health care provider about the vaccine if you have: a severe allergy to chicken eggs or any other ingredients in the vaccine, a history of severe reaction to a flu vaccination, a moderate-to-severe illness with a fever or have a history of Gullian-Barre Syndrome.

**Medicare**- Open enrollment is October 15 – December 7, 2015. During this past year, have you: Changed the medications you take? Been diagnosed with a new medical condition? Any of those changes could mean that your current Medicare plan no longer meets your needs.

Medicare plans also change. The costs of your plan can go up or down, prescription drugs can be added or dropped from the list of drugs (the formulary) included in your plan. Some Medicare plans change the benefits they offer or stop offering coverage in a particular location.

Because of such changes, you should check your current Medicare plan and, if necessary, switch to another plan that fits you better.
