
September 20, 2015

As we age we face challenges that we did not think twice about in earlier days. Accepting changes in your abilities and adapting new coping strategies will help you restore balance, reduce stress and maintain your feeling of wellbeing.

Keep in mind that what works well for one person may not work for another. When developing your coping strategies, the more flexible you can be, the better you can fine-tune your strategies.

- Set realistic goals and focus on what you can do today. Some tasks may become too difficult for you to complete, reduce stress by asking family or friends for help.
- . **Develop a daily routine.** Having a schedule can reduce the time you spend figuring out what needs to be done and when, and makes you more successful in accomplishing your goals and limiting mistakes.
- . Approach one task at a time and don't get stuck. Give yourself enough time to complete a task. Don't pressure yourself to succeed. If something becomes too difficult, take a break and try again later.
- . Know that you have more than one chance to solve most problems. It's not uncommon to have to try different strategies to achieve your overall goal.
- Recognize the triggers that cause you stress. Knowing what causes stress allows you to make plans in advance or decisions about the type of activities/tasks you choose to participate in.

Use your sources of strength. Family, friends, prayers, your inner strength, pets, your Parish Nurse (570-621-3220) – While it may seem like a sign of weakness at first, asking for help when you need it may help you maintain your independence and remain in control, all these sources can get you through hard times, even as you face daily challenges or setbacks.

Scam Alert: The FBI warns of a funeral fraud perpetrated on seniors. Scammers read obituaries and call or attend the funeral service of a complete stranger to take advantage of the grieving widow or widower, claiming the deceased had an outstanding debt with them. The scammers will try to extort money from relatives to settle fake debts.

Another particularly elaborate property tax scam seen in California has fraudsters sending personalized letters to different properties apparently on behalf of the County Assessor's Office. This letter, made to look official but displaying only public information, identifies the property's assessed value and offers the homeowner, for a fee of course, to arrange for a reassessment of the property's value and therefore the tax burden associated with it.

Arbor Day Celebration-April 25, 2015

Arbor Day was a sunny, but chilly day. It represented the 15th year of a tree planting program that began in 2000. Each year 10 new trees are planted and blessed with a tree sponsorship of \$400 per tree. The proceeds from the tree sponsorship are used to removed dead or diseased trees, that left unattended, could fall or break off and could cause damage to neighboring property (as they have done in the past) or can damage nearby memorial markers.

This year we were very blessed in having 11 trees sponsored. Ten new trees were planted this year, but one unsponsored tree remained from last year, so we had the perfect number of trees available for sponsorship. We, the board are very thankful for the sponsors, many of whom have continued to sponsor trees over the past several years.

(8) Horse Chestnut given in loving memory of Rogene D. Kulp Motney by Fred and Dona Brown. (9) Ginkgo given in thanksgiving for a loving husband and a wonderful life of Robert Moser by Peggy Moser. (10) Swamp White Oak given in loving memory of Nancy Williams by Corinne Gearhart. (11) Pin oak given in thanksgiving for our grandson Adam Schmitz by Mickey and Betty Bradley.

The Charles Baber Cemetery, constructed as a cemetery within a garden park setting, has a wide and healthy variety of trees. Except for the outlying perimeter area and the hillside between the upper and lower sections, all of the trees have been identified and plotted. The four section plot plan and the descriptions of the many trees have been placed on the cemetery's website at <u>babercemetery.org</u>. These trees are spectacular in any season, and because of this, all attempts were made to photograph the various trees in different seasons. Come and enjoy the trees in person or on the website.

RESTORATION PROJECT

The extensive road and pavement work at the 16th Street entrance is 90% complete. The new sidewalks, the new curbing, and the re-sloping of the road were very effective in deterring the water from entering the property from 16th St. Street and from West End Avenue. To appreciate the benefit of this work, all one has to do is visit the site during a heavy torrential rain. The final coat and sealer, at a cost of \$4,000, remains to be placed on the road. This won't be done until the drain work is complete. Two drains closest to the 16th entrance work were cleaned out, broken pipes replaced, and they were given new catch basins and new grates.

The pond is cleaned out and has a new concrete spillway and a mountain rock entrance way where the water feeds into the pond. Ten drains remained to be set with new concrete basins, blocked pipes cleaned out, new grates placed on the drains, 2B stone fill placed around the basins, and then the area around the grates covered with asphalt. The basin work and the partial 2B stone fill was done on six of these drains in early spring. During the week of June 15-19, the 6 drains begun in the spring were finished with 2B stone fill and asphalt. Three of the remaining 4 drains were also completed. We are meeting with the contractor to determine the cost of the work on the remaining drain, but its completion remains uncertain at this time unless we receive additional contributions. Just like the rest of our bodies, our eyes have different needs as we age. The risk of contracting a number age – related eye diseases –such as glaucoma, cataracts and macular degeneration will increase.



Tips for protecting your eyes:

- 1. Know if you are at higher risk for eye diseases. Be aware of your family's health history. Regular eye exams are particularly important, because an early diagnosis can limit any vision loss and help preserve your eyesight.
- 2. Have regular physical exams to check for diabetes and high blood pressure. If left untreated, these diseases can cause eye problems.
- 3. Look for warning signs of changes in your vision. If you start noticing changes in your vision, see your eye doctor immediately. Some trouble signs to look for include: double vision, hazy vision and difficulty seeing in lowlight conditions. Other signs to look for are frequent flashes of light, floaters, eye pain and swelling. All of these indicate a potential eye health problem that demands immediate attention.
- 4. Exercise more frequently. Some studies suggest that regular exercise —such as walking —can reduce the risk of age-related macular degeneration by up to 70%.
- 5. Protect your eyes from harmful UV light. You should always wear sunglasses with proper UV protection to shield your eyes from the sun's harmful ultraviolet rays. This may help reduce your risk of cataracts and other eye damage.
- 6. Eat a healthy balanced diet. Fruits and dark green vegetables containing antioxidants can possibly help reduce the risk of cataracts. And a diet rich in omega-3 fatty acids may reduce your risk of developing macular degeneration.
- 7. Get your eyes checked at least every two years.

8. Don't smoke. People who smoke are at greater risk of developing age-related macular degeneration and cataracts.

Lyme Disease: While it is a good idea to take preventive measures against ticks year-round be extra vigilant in warmer months when ticks are most active. Lyme disease is a bacterial illness that is spread by tick bites. Use Natural or purchased tick repellent when hiking or walking in wooded and bushy areas with high grass and leaf litter.

If you find a tick attached to your skin: grasp it as close to the skin's surface as possible with fine tipped tweezers, pull upward with steady even pressure, clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol. Dispose of the tick by submerging it in alcohol and place it in a sealed bag. See a Doctor if you develop a fever, rash, severe fatigue, facial paralysis or joint pain within 30 days of being bitten by a tick. Lyme disease is treated by antibiotics but if untreated, you may later experience severe arthritis, problems with your nerves, spinal cord, brain or
