
#### Organ Fund

#### **Summer Reading Camp News**


The teachers from the Summer Reading Camp would like to thank you for your support of this very worthwhile outreach. Your financial support and prayers were

#### **News from Marion C. Price Trust Fund**

It is hard to believe it is September already! The year is winding down, the days are getting shorter and kids are heading back to school. Both of my children are in college this year so my house will be quiet. Where does the time go? I suppose the saying is true-time flies when you're having fun! As fall approaches and we prepare for colder weather many of us begin to think about getting our vaccinations. Until the corona virus became part of our daily life, we tended to focus mostly on vaccines for the flu or pneumonia. Now we need to prepare for colder weather by being up to date on all our shots and boosters.

#### **COVID-19 VACCINE**

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) recommends COVID-19 primary series vaccines for everyone 6 months and older, and boosters for everyone ages 5 years and older, if eligible. If you have received your primary series of COVID-19 shots, the boosters are recommended as follows:

1<sup>st</sup> booster: preferably of either Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccine for most people at least 5 months after final dose in primary series.

 $2^{nd}$  booster of either Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccine for adults 50 years and older at least 4 months after  $1^{st}$  booster.

COVID-19 vaccines and boosters are available in clinics, pharmacies and health care provider locations. There is no cost to you for the vaccine.

You will be considered "up to date" immediately after getting all boosters recommended for you.

#### INFLUENZA VACCINE

The CDC recommends everyone over 8 years of age get vaccinated every flu season. It takes about 2 weeks for protection to develop after vaccination and generally lasts 6-8 months. It is best to be vaccinated before the flu begins spreading in your community. September and October are generally good times to be vaccinated against the flu. Ideally, everyone should be vaccinated by the end of October. The vaccine is available from your health care provider, pharmacy and clinics. Medicare part B covers one flu shot per flu season. Most private insurance plans cover the vaccine but check your individual plan to be sure. Free or low-cost flu shots are offered through clinics, community organizations and public health departments.

#### PNEUMOCOCCAL VACCINE

Vaccines can prevent pneumococcal disease, which is any type of illness caused by Streptococcus pneumonia bacteria. The CDC recommends all adults 65 years and older be vaccinated. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) licensed the first pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV7 or Prevnar) in 2000. Studies have shown it is highly effective in preventing invasive pneumococcal disease and more brands have been approved in 2010 and 2021. Most people who get a pneumococcal vaccine do not have any serious problems. As with any medicine or vaccine, there is a chance of side effects. These are usually mild and go away on their own within a few days, but serious reactions are possible. Consult with your doctor on the best type of vaccine. It should be available in your doctor's office and usually covered by Medicare part B.

#### SHINGLES VACCINATION

CDC recommends that adults 50 years and older get two doses of the shingles vaccine called Shingrix (recombinant zoster vaccine) to prevent shingles and the complications from the disease. Chickenpox and shingles are related because they are caused by the same virus (varicella-zoster virus). After a person recovers from chickenpox the virus stays dormant in the body. It can reactivate years later and cause shingles.

You may get this vaccine even if you don't remember having chicken pox or even if you have had shingles. Shingles vaccination is the only way to protect against shingles and postherpetic neuralgia (PHN), the most common complication of shingles. The Shingrix vaccine provides strong protection against shingles and PHN. Immunity stays strong for at least the first 7 years after vaccination. Most people get a sore arm with mild or moderate pain, and some have redness and swelling where they got the shot. Medicare part B does not cover the shingles vaccine but Medicare part D does cover it. Depending on your plan there may be a cost to you such as a copay or out-of-pocket payment and reimbursement of a certain amount. Check your individual plan or call your doctor's office for payment details. Shingrix is available in doctors' offices and pharmacies. If you have any questions about getting this vaccine or potential side effects, talk with your doctor.

#### **TETANUS, DIPHTHERIA, and WHOOPING COUGH VACCINE**

CDC recommends diphtheria, tetanus, and whooping cough (pertussis) vaccination (Tdap) for everyone. All adults who have never received one should get a Tdap vaccine. This can be given at any time regardless of when they last got a tetanus shot (Td). This should be followed by either a Td or Tdap every 10 years. Side effects are usually mild and go away on their own in a few days. It is best to discuss what type is needed with your doctor.

Other vaccines or boosters may be needed based on your age, health conditions, and lifestyle. Certain vaccines are also needed for travel. It is important to discuss all vaccines and boosters with your healthcare professional to assess your individual health needs and risk factors. Most vaccines do work well and while they may not always prevent the disease, they may lessen the severity of it. It looks like the monkeypox virus is the latest virus to spread through the United States. We can hope and pray it will not reach pandemic proportions such as the COVID-19 virus did. Follow your health care provider's recommendations, wear a mask if you like, and wash your hands frequently. I pray you all stay safe and healthy!



#### Coming Soon: Autumn's Finest Display of Color Sept.\Oct. 2022

Beginning in September and continuing into early November, autumn dazzles us with a rainbow of colors that differ greatly between the tree species. Some species, like the

dawn redwoods, bald cypress, eastern red cedar, swamp white oak, and cryptomeria pick up the earth tones of rust, amber, chocolate, mahogany, carnelian, walnut, cinnamon, and almond. While others, like all the 'sunset' red maples, dwarf red maples, regular red maples and the copper beach pick up the deep reds of scarlet, crimson, carmine, claret, burgundy, and cerise. Other trees like the elms, little leaf linden, Norway maples, ginkgoes, hornbeam, box elder, London planetree, black locust, black walnut, and American beech prefer the yellow colors of straw, wheat, butter, gold, lemon, canary, and dandelion. And others like the sweetgum, white ash, staghorn sumac, sugar maple, black gum, black cherry, dogwoods, Kentucky coffee tree, and tulip tree pick up the orange tones of tangerine, cantaloupe, papaya, peach, carrot, and apricot. And then we have the red and white oaks whose dominant fall colors are dependent on the amount of rain and heat. The leaves can be yellow and straw-colored one year and peach and apricot colored another year. Also aside from the trees, notice the full display and varieties of mushrooms found at the base of some trees, or buried in the grass, or along the stone steps between the levels, or on the fence line near Wachter's garage. And then we have the winter storage food for the squirrels in the form of many sizes of acorns hanging primarily from the oaks, the spiky nut balls of the American beech, and the green shell-covered nuts on the black walnut. And other ornamentation of the long dangling bunched samara clusters hanging from the sycamore maples, the spike balls on the sweetgum, and the brown shaker seed pods on the black locust and the eastern redbud. Come and walk the property and see the splashy and heart-warming fall colors. Enjoy nature's grand display and lingering farewell of its fall season.

#### Second Full-Time Worker Needed

The cemetery employs two full-time workers and several part-time workers. The full-time workers are paid a salary and full benefits including health insurance and pension. The part-time workers are paid through Career Link's state funding. For the past three years, we have been unable to get any part-time help from Career Link, which leaves us with two full-time employees doing all the work. Unfortunately one of our two full-time employees has accepted a job in NJ. We have been without a second full-time worker for six weeks. We have posted twice in the newspaper and are currently waiting to see if anyone applies to this second ad. Tom has done a commendable job of trying to keep up with the grass cutting, but there are never enough hours in the day to weed whack around the memorial markers. Two of our board members volunteer to help out occasionally with weed whacking. However, within another month, the beautiful fall foliage will bring plenty of fallen leaves which have to be blown into great piles along the main road for the city to vacuum up. If you can volunteer a few hours or know of anyone interested in working full time, please contact the office.

#### **Update on East and West Gatehouses**

At the time of this writing, much has been done to the gatehouses, and yet much remains to be done primarily to the east gatehouse. The west gatehouse has the support beams and flooring at the second level, and a poured concrete floor. It still needs electrical power, and we are not sure how the roof is. The wood facade at the top of both gatehouses has been painted and the rotted wood replaced. They both will need a metal overhang capping once the roof, electrical wiring, outlets, and lighting, trap rock dumped in the root cellar, a concrete floor poured over the trap rock, the ceiling patched, and the walls and ceiling painted. At the time of this writing, we have paid \$31,953 in repair bills for the two gatehouses with this money coming from insurance (\$28,327), community and parishioner support (\$7,685), and a partial grant reimbursement (\$3,297). However, the bad news is, that it will cost approximately \$23,500 to complete the work just mentioned. We may be able to apply for a partial grant from the diocese (minus the work covered by the insurance). Most of the \$16,144 shortfall will come from our investment account (\$10,000 -\$12,000) and from wages and insurance\pension that would have been paid to our second full-time worker which we haven't had for 6 weeks (\$2,000), and the balance from columbarium and plot sales or if any community or parishioner donations are received. If you can contribute, it would be greatly appreciated.
